Operation Christmas Child Mission 2021

We will be activating the Operation Christmas Child mission this year. Due to the pandemic, this was put on hold last year. A lot of items were donated beforehand so we do have a head start. Due to the time frame, we will provide a list of items that are suggested through the Samaritan Purse website. The following is an idea for you to look at.

Age 2 - 4

Wow gift such as a stuffed animal, soccer ball with manual air pump. An outfit of clothing to wear. A small musical instrument, as in harmonica or woodwind recorder

Personal Care items: such as comb, hairbrush, toothbrush, washcloths, colorful themed Band-Aids, markers, sunglasses or blanket and colorful hair bows for girls.

Clothing: shirts, pants, underwear, shoes and socks, flip flops, hat, scarf, mittens.

Crafts & Activities: pencils with sharpeners, colored pencils, crayons, markers, pens, coloring and picture books, coloring pads, notebooks, Playdough, make it yourself craft kit, stickers, building blocks

Toys: foam ball, kickball, finger puppets, slinky, small kite, etch a sketch and interactive toys that include push buttons, lights, noise and be sure to include extra batteries.

Age 5 -9

The Wow items are about the same as listed above, maybe items for an older child.

Personal Care: same as listed above; a flashlight was added such as the crank kind or battery operated along with extra batteries.

Clothing & Accessories: a wrist watch is added to this category, tote bag, friendship bracelet

Crafts & Activities: binoculars have been added, chalkboard and chalk, jump rope, fishing kits, tools with gloves, magnets, kaleidoscope

School Supplies: blank index cards, pencils with manual sharpeners, erasers, colored pencils, pens, crayons, markers, solar powered calculators, blunt scissors, ruler, protractor, glue stick, (not liquid

Toys: added items are costume items to play dress-up, plastic toy figures, yo-yo, small Frisbee, small kite

Age 10 - 14

Wow Item: a backpack was added and a doll for girls

Personal Care: nail clipper and file was added, stick deodorant,

Clothing: bead jewelry/bead kit, hair accessories for girls, and bandana for boys.

Craft & Activities: compass, marbles, playing card games

School Supplies: are the same

Toys: baseball and mitt for boys Hacky Sack

We so hope that you are well. We know that many people in the US and the world are being hit by another Covid-19 wave. At GYTTE 90% of the staff are vaccinated. We are excited that a group from Pennsylvania is coming early next year and we will be building a home. We take all the safety precautions, please consider coming here on a Mission Trip soon. And we can do a Virtual Mission Trip with your Church when you want!



If you are friends with Give Ye Them to Eat on Facebook you have seen short videos of recent work very near the Gulf of Mexico in the state of Veracruz. People in villages were very affected by Hurricane Grace and didn't have running water (they still don't) so they were getting water out of wells with buckets.

Catalino and Miguel went there two weeks ago and with the community identified two wells with good water where anyone could go and get water. They installed two appropriate

technology rope pumps over two days. With this technology you just turn a

handle and water comes out easily. This small project has made people's lives a lot better. The villagers were very grateful and GYTTE is so happy to have helped.

The last few months we have been preparing for the Advanced Course which is the third course for the Health Promotors. The course begins Sunday Sept. 19 and lasts through the 25th. The women will be graduating and will receive their diplomas at the Methodist Church in Tlancualpicán on Sept. 23. A ton of work goes into this! The women have been vaccinated, we will use masks and, as you know, everything is in the open air. Please pray for the women as they learn about at least 20 new themes!



Volunteer In Mission Sunday

United Methodist Volunteers in Mission (UMVIM) has been in existence since 1976. The 1980 General Conference affirmed United Methodist Volunteers in Mission "as an authentic form of personal missionary involvement" (The Book of Discipline, 2004, Paragraph 1302.14). In 2016, General Conference approved the annual celebration of United Methodist Volunteers in Mission Awareness Sunday to recognize all volunteers. United Methodist Volunteers in Mission seeks to equip volunteers with experiences that allow them to put Christian love into action in places around the world. The projects that volunteers can serve with are as diverse as the number of places they serve. Some of the work involves assisting communities with maintaining clean water sources. According to

the World Health Organization, 1.8 million people use water from contaminated sources every day. Other work involves the building of churches in impoverished areas and helping people who are in desperate need of not only food and clean water, but also the hope of Jesus. Additional projects include working at medical clinics, teaching English, and improving substandard housing in the United States and globally. UMVIM recognizes the important work of putting Christian love into action across the globe. The success and engagement in God's mission, is training, accountability and celebrating our mission journey.

Center for Alternatives in Community Justice

At the Center for Alternatives in Community Justice (CACJ) we serve society by working with the community and justice system to promote, develop, and implement effective alternatives that preserve human dignity, restore, heal, and empower individuals.

Community Citizens began CACJ in 1976 as a grassroots effort to address the problems faced by offenders reentering the community. It was incorporated in 1978 and then the agency began collaborating with local judges, district justices, police, prison staff, attorneys, and human services to design and implement programs in Centre County.

The Community Service Program was officially established in 1979 in cooperation with Centre County Probation and Parole. This new program allowed judges to sentence offenders to community service under CACJ's volunteers' supervision. In 1984, after CACJ had supervised hundreds of offenders, it was agreed that the Probation Department would assume total responsibility for the program. CACJ received the Centre County Medical Society's Benjamin Rush Award for Outstanding Health Services for this program.



Caring for People in Need - Angel Tree

In 2021, we hope to return to our longstanding angel tree tradition. While COVID-19 changed our practices in 2020, Mt. Nittany usually displays a tree in the church lobby decorated with lights and paper angels. Written on each angel are the Christmas gift wishes passed along to us from by various community groups, such as Centre Safe, Interfaith Human Services, local schools, or church members who know someone in need. Parishioners take the angels, buy the gifts written on them, and place them under the tree. The season-long event is capped off when church members gather to wrap all of the presents for delivery to agencies and families. Stay alert for more announcements about dates! While the congregation's generosity takes care of the requests that we get well in advance, it's not unusual to get last-minute requests. Your donations on these special Sundays let us say "Yes" to as many families as possible. Thank you for your kind contributions.

The Giving Garden

The Giving Garden closed a bit early this year, in early September, due to the extreme heat followed by nonstop rainy days and then clouds. Typically we would plant lettuce and spinach for the fall, but gardeners everywhere know that you have to be flexible and patient.

As an experiment, we have planted three cover crops. Since Mother Nature looks at an empty plot of dirt as a mistake, she fixes that with a "band aid" of weeds. To mitigate that, and improve the garden soil after 8 years of nonstop planting, we are trying a new strategy. Our covers are field peas, tilling radish, and red clover.

These will grow, pull nitrogen from the air for future plants, break up the clay soil, and provide organic matter once we spade them in next spring. They've only been planted in the last bed, which will be replaced next spring. Our whole crop of winter squash was unfortunately picked prematurely by unknown people, and while that's disappointing it gave us a chance to try something new.

The garden will also be given a 3' border to help with weed control; thank you to people who have donated to that cause since our budget isn't quite going to cover the expense. On Oct 7, a crew from The United Way's Day of Caring will come to pull up old landscaping fabric in one aisle and replace it with new materials, helping to lessen the weeding load next year.

CHURCH'S ONE FOUNDATION

Our thoughts on what the church is varies from person to person. A poll shows over 50% pointed to a structure. Now we know the church is not a building but the people in it right? "Church" is the translation of the Greek term ekklesia and is used in the New Testament to identify the community of believers in Jesus Christ. It literally means "assembly", "congregation" or "meeting". A similar term was used in the Old Testament to experience such as "The day of assembly", "The Lords Congregation" or "meeting before The Lord."

When Jesus declares; "I will build my church (math 16.18 it did not come as something unfamiliar to the congregation of believers in Jesus Christs. Here's a worth mentioning, In the New Testament, no synagogue or, temple, chapel, tabernacle, building or any other meeting place was ever called the "church'.

Paul's letters were to the people

not a building.

Where my brothers and sisters do you find us witch letter and which church do we aline? Have we lost our first love? Christ is not in any need of our fine building but in us alone as we are the "Church" that will further his kingdom. No building can do that only we, as his children. To grow the church we must be in the church. Where there are 3 or more gathered I am there.
