Spring finally feels as though it has arrived. Having just finished Holy Week and Easter Sunday, it feels like even the land around us is "resurrecting" from its Winter slumber. Flowers are blooming, the grass is growing (rapidly I might add), and the air has more warmth than cold in it.

Just as the Earth is returning to life after Winter, so too the church typically experiences new life after Easter.

As we enter into this season of growth, may we nurture our faith as much as we nurture the plants we set into the ground and pots. Just as we begin to care for the yards, may we care for our souls. Finally, just neighbors emerge from their homes and begin talking from porch to porch and yard to yard, may we too talk to those we meet with the excitement of our resurrected Lord.

Matthew 28 says this, "16 Now the eleven disciples went to Galilee, to the mountain to which Jesus had directed them. 17 When they saw him, they worshiped him, but they doubted. 18 And Jesus came and said to them, "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. 19 Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit 20 and teaching them to obey everything that I have commanded you. And remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age." I quote it here because while this is a season of growth, there will also always be a level of doubt and uncertainty about what comes next. There is nothing wrong with this, it demonstrates a willingness to admit our lack of knowing, our openness to learning, and our ability to grow. Even in the midst of the disciple's worship of Jesus, they doubted. Even in the receiving of the Great Commission, they doubted. Even in their leaving Galilee and sharing the "good news" of the gospel, they doubted. In each instance of their following Jesus, before and after the resurrection, they grew from one doubt being resolved only to discover a new doubt arising. They did not doubt Jesus, Jesus' love for them, or the good news of the gospel. They doubted their abilities to carry out the commission, they doubted who all Jesus was sending them to, they doubted their reception from the world. It didn't matter then and it doesn't matter now. Following Jesus moves us or better yet causes us to grow from one doubt to the next. Each time we doubt and grow beyond it, our ability to love like Jesus

MAY 4: NATIVE AMERICAN MINISTRIES SUNDAY

Native American Ministries Sunday serves to remind United Methodists of the gifts and contributions made by Native Americans to our society. With more than 20,000 Native Americans within the denomination, this special Sunday helps to ensure that Native American United Methodist leaders are recognized. It was officially recognized in 1988 and has been celebrated on the 3rd Sunday of Easter since 1989. An offering is taken on this Special Sunday to develop and strengthen Native American ministries in the Annual Conferences, Native American rural, urban, reservation ministries and communities relating to the General Board of Global Ministries. It also provides scholarships for Native Americans attending United Methodist schools of theology distributed by the General Board of Higher Education and Ministry.

MAY 11: GOLDEN CROSS

A loving God, said the psalmist, promises "goodness and mercy" throughout life. When your congregation gives generously on Golden Cross Sunday, you offer hope and happiness to children, families and older adults through health and welfare ministries of your annual conference.

MAY 18: MENTAL HEALTH AWARENESS SUNDAY

Organizations in the United States began promoting Mental Health Awareness week in 1949. The event eventually came to encompass Mental Health Month, observed annually in May. The Susquehanna Conference of the United Methodist Church marks the occasion with Mental Health Awareness Sunday, when we recognize the need to support ministries that attend to the mental health of God's children.
