### Focus on Missions June

### JUNE 1: UMCOR - INERNATIONAL DISASTERS

The United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR) responds to dozens of disasters each year. Whether it is in response to war, like the crisis in Ukraine or a tsunami in South Asia UMCOR is there: sowing seeds of hope and empowering communities to step forward to a new and better future. When a natural or human-caused disaster strikes outside of the United States, UMCOR serves as the primary channel for United Methodist assistance. This includes support for displaced persons as well as refugees fleeing disasters with food, water, hygiene and other essential nonfood supplies and temporary shelter. UMCOR cooperates with church leaders, local agencies and not-for-profit organizations to develop response mechanisms and to support local relief and recovery efforts.

### JUNE 8: THE MOMMY SHOPPE

The Mommy Shoppe llc, a non-profit 501(c)3 organization, was started in August 2011 as a mission of the Houserville UMC - House of HOPE at 1320 Houserville Road, State College, PA. We have expanded to serving over 1500 clients, staffed entirely by volunteers. Our volunteers process all the donations - sorting clothing by size, pairing socks and shoes, tagging items, hanging clothing on the racks, organizing books, and many other tasks.

### JUNE 15: CONFERENCE CAMPS

The Susquehanna Conference Camp & Retreat Ministry Board has been working diligently for the past two years studying, assessing, prayerfully discerning, and developing strategic direction. The goal of this in-depth process is to provide the best way forward for the future of the overall ministry, its growth, and its missional impact among a widening circle of people in our congregations and communities. Central to it all has been a deep cherishing and valuing of the importance of camp and retreat experiences and the unique benefits and life transforming opportunities they provide.

### JUNE 22: PEACE WITH JUSTICE & PRISON AWARENESS - SPECIAL ENVELOPE

The United Methodist Church uses this day to speak out for peace and justice. Our Social Principles call us to love our enemies, seek justice, and serve as peacemakers in resolving conflict. We renew our commitment that to live into our mission of transforming the world, we must prioritize collaboration among nations, work to reduce the use and need for weapons, and foster just, equitable and durable solutions to the root causes of conflict.

### JUNE 29: HELPING OTHER PEOPLE EXCEL, INC.

It all started with a family in our community that needed help when faced with a horrific accident. When things seemed hopeless, a group of concerned people came together to raise money for this family. Following our first response to a need, it was suggested that we continue our efforts to help others in the surrounding areas. H.O.P.E. has provided financial assistance to families following flood damage and purchased durable medical equipment after accidents.

### Focus on Missions July

### JULY 6: CARING FOR PEOPLE IN NEED - ANGEL TREE

In July, we'll take several weeks to dedicate our weekly charitable collection to causes that we often turn our minds to during the Christmas season. The first of these is the Angel Tree. A long tradition at Mt. Nittany UMC, we'll use giving this month to start planning the number of families we can help. In a year of financial unpredictability from world events and frightening inflation stories, it's a good time to begin thinking about what the season will be like for those who find it difficult to meet regular needs. While we might associate Christmas gifts with children's toys, and we do provide those, for families in need gifts often provide needed clothing and we regularly gift other household needs that families can struggle to provide for themselves. Please prayerfully consider what contribution you would like to make to this charitable cause.

### JULY 13: CENTRE VOLUNTEERS IN MEDICINE

CVIM offers free medical care for those with a household income at or below 250% of the federal poverty level, seeking to ensure that all those who live and work in Centre County have access to health care services. As Centre Count grows, so do the demands on the healthcare infrastructure around us. CVIM is in the middle of a capital campaign to help them move from their current 6,700 square foot space to a new facility with more than 11,000 square feet. The larger space will allow CVIM to provide more and broader services to those in the medical community who struggle to obtain medical care.

### JULY 20: CHILDREN'S PLAYGROUND MINISTRY

Mt Nittany UMC provides a number of ministries (Giving Garden, Prayer Garden, Playground and large open spaces) located throughout our outside campus. These ministries are available to our members, rental clients and the public to use. Annual funding is needed towards the maintenance of our playground to ensure the children have a safe and pleasurable experience during outside play.

### JULY 27: CENTRE SAFE (WOMEN'S RESOURCE CENTER)

Founded in 1975 as the Centre County Women's Resource Center, the mission of Centre Safe is to empower survivors of sexual or domestic violence, and to work toward the elimination of such violence. Among the services the center provides are a 24-hour crisis hotline and emergency shelter to victims. In the 2020-2021 year, Centre Safe assisted over 1,200 people with domestic violence services, sexual assault services, and child access services.
