It is that time of Spring when plant people look at their various gardens and outdoor pots and ask the age old question, "Is it dead or alive?" There is a level of anxious anticipation to see buds, sprouts, crowns, and any other sign of life for favorite plants. The longer we see no signs of

life, the more despondent we become for that particular plant ... and then, "is that a bump, a bud, a green shoot, a change in color of the stem?" Hope continues.

For many people, even today, there is an anxious, hopeful waiting to see life in their spirituality, their church, their community. Not just any life, life that brings hope and a sense of fulfillment; even in the face of adversity, cruelty, and instability. So what signals life in the followers of Jesus?

Some churches have stated that the amount of stuff they do points to life, others will say the number of people giving first time commitments to God and being baptized is a sign of life, still others will say their ability to support missions is a sign of life. Bear with me for a minute, what if it isn't these things that point to life? What if these are the result of life, but the real sign of life is much deeper, much more intimate, more personal?

Many of us who have grown up in the church or have been part of the church for a substantial amount of time will have heard about the Gifts of the Spirit. We take assessments to help guide us to what our gifts may be and, hopefully, learn how to use them for the upbuilding of God's children in the church, the wider community, and then the world. These gifts are vital, but I'm not sure we can say that these are the signs of life either. They too are a result of there being life.

The next thing we may have heard in the church is about the Fruit of the Spirit. We find these listed in Galatians 5:22-23, "By contrast, the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control. There is no law against such things".

OPEN OPPORTUNITIES OF SERVICE

God calls each and everyone of us to be the hands and feet of Jesus in the world. How that looks often differs from person to person. Some have gifts best used behind the scenes, while others do best being at the forefront. Regardless of how God has called you, we each have been given gifts of the Spirit and talents to help us utilize those gifts. Below are some opportunities to serve God, the church, and others. Some are more "in person" and others are (mostly) "behind the scenes"

These service opportunities are open for a variety of reasons (people moving, entering the Kingdom Triumphant, or health concerns necessitating a change of service to name a few). Here they are with a very brief description.

Memorial Committee Chair - This individual chairs the Memorial Committee (meets 1-2 times a year), sends out letters to families to inform them of memorial funds that have been received for their loved one and how those funds have been used, keeps track of memorial funds and who those funds have been given in memory of. This person would be good at organizing and keeping current with memorials received and spent. This "might" be considered a behind the scenes service opportunity.

Church Decorating Coordinator - Organizes the decorating team for the various seasons of the liturgical church year, prepares the orders for the flowers used during holidays and summer flower bed planting.

Home Communion Stewards - These individuals bring communion to our homebound members and constituents once a month. While taking communion to these individuals, typically a bulletin, newsletter, and devotional are also taken along. Finally, each person they see for communion has some time spent visiting, catching up on what is happening at the church, receiving prayer, and above all love from God and their congregation.

Prayer Chain Coordinator - This person would help the pastor re-establish a prayer chain. There are often times when the church office or the pastor receives a request to put someone on the prayer chain and the Sunday morning prayer list. This coordinator would organize a team of persons deeply devoted to intercessory prayer (prayer for people in need).

With these thoughts in mind, helping to understand who is responsible for what might be helpful for all of us.

Typically the church has new or returning leaders announced at Church Conference and they take office in January. While this information was shared, it could have been done much better and I, as the pastor, take responsibility for that breakdown. So, here are the various persons in the congregation responsible for helping us accomplish our ministry of making disciples of Jesus as we love boldly, serve joyfully, and lead courageously. If I miss anyone, I apologize and will ensure to update to ensure we continue to improve communication within the congregation.

Our trustees are led by Gerry Dunn and Lee Copper. This group of individuals are responsible for the building, property, legal contracts, and property use. If there are issues with the building and grounds, these are your people.

Our Children & Youth ministries are led by Patty DeCapria. While Patty volunteers and serves in many capacities within our congregation, such as some of our family ministries, working with the children and youth is her primary area of service. If you have questions around ministry to and with young persons, she is the go to! This would include outreach (Egg Hunt, Trunk or Treat, etc.) to VBS and Children's church.

Pat Weaver and Amy Williams are the two to talk to about the finances of the congregation. These two understand our budget better than almost anyone else. FROM THE AUDIO/VISUAL BOOTH

Sunday Audio/Visual Booth Help Needed

That booth in the back of the church may seem very intimidating and you may think it requires knowledge about technology that you do not have. WRONG! Here's a short description of each position.

Sound attendant – Looking at that sound board is daunting. However, it is all preset. The only thing someone has to do is push the mute button for the various mikes being used. Usually it is only the handheld or the lapel/ear mike. Occasionally the pulpit mike is used. All the other mikes stay on or off and don't need attention during the service.

Slide attendant – This is done at the computer. Just advance the slides as the service progresses. Paying attention is the main skill needed. Pushing the button to put the screens down before service and up at the end of service, using the remotes to turn the projectors on before service and after are other jobs. There may be a few other buttons to attend to on the Kramer box. No worries. This is rare and you will be shown.

Livestream attendant – No lie. This requires a bit more training. Emily will work with you until you feel comfortable. Once you have it, you will be a pro. There are instructions to refer to and LOTS of support. It does not really require technological knowledge.

Slide creation – No lie here either. Knowing how to do Powerpoint is a good start. We use ProPresenter and this does require training and a time commitment. Dawn or Emily will train you. There are also several Youtube training videos that can be helpful.

Don't be afraid to find out more about any of these jobs. If you want to sit in the booth for a service or two to see things in action, no problem. If you want to see how the slide creations work, no problem. Just let Emily Gregory know you are interested. (See contact information below). Help is need for all these positions and training and support is plentiful!

These are listed immediately after a list of the "desires of the flesh" which, if you go and read them, there is plenty of evidence of in the world.

So, how do we produce this fruit that, I believe, demonstrates true life. Every single one of these fruits are actionable. They can be done over and over, practiced until they become "muscle memory" of our very spirit. They are not bound by human boundaries meant to separate person from person. They are not bound by law. They are free, life giving, hope providing.

Now that Spring is in full swing, take a look at your life. Are you producing fruit? How is that fruit developing? Is there "pruning" that needs done to ensure a bigger, larger "crop" of Spiritual fruit? The way we determine this is over against the very list found in the previous verses of Galatians 5. With the "weeds" listed there, we must ensure we are striving to keep ourselves centered on what Jesus would do? What Jesus would call us to? What would change for the better if we focused on the Fruit of the Spirit rather than the fruit of the flesh?

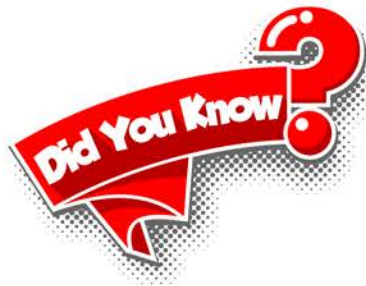
