There are times in life when things feel ... heavy. It is the only word I can think of to describe certain times of challenging topics or circumstances. These are the burdens that weigh on the soul, causing sleeplessness or restlessness. In good Wesleyan terms - the dark night of the soul.

Recently, this has felt to be the circumstances surrounding many pastoral and lay leaders of our churches. Mt. Nittany has not been immune. When these seasons arrive, it is easy to slip into anger, confrontation, or despondence. None of these are helpful. Rather, they point to being overwhelmed, overburdened. When this becomes the reality, it is helpful to be reminded of Jesus's words from Matthew 11:28-30, 28 "Come to me, all you who are weary and are carrying heavy burdens, and I will give you rest. 29 Take my yoke upon you, and learn from me, for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. 30 For my yoke is easy, and my burden is light."

Jesus is not making light of our experience of being overburdened, but he does offer to redirect us toward sharing our burden with him. Too often we feel we must carry challenge all on our own. Our very culture celebrates carrying more than we can bear. Almost to the point of suggesting that if we are not constantly on the verge of burnout we aren't working hard enough.

I would posit that Jesus offers a counter-cultural approach. Share the burden with him, allow him to carry the burden. Since we as the church are called the body of Christ, allow the body to help carry you.

Having grown up on a farm, I know of many chores that required moving heavy items around. Those heavy burdens we much easier to move when the weight was shared.

I write all of this to say this, "If you have feeling overburdened, turn to Jesus. Allow the body of Christ to bear the burden. We are not called to bear all things and we certainly are not called to bear them alone.

FOCUS ON MISSION AUGUST

AUGUST 3: RURAL LIFE SUNDAY

Rural Life Sunday is a Sunday set aside to honor and affirm churches and leaders in rural settings, while also honoring the work of those who labor to provide us food and fiber, both in the United States and around the world. On this day, we also celebrate the gifts of creation itself. Rural churches are a part of our history and our present in The United Methodist Church. These churches have the unique opportunity of anchoring a community and providing outreach to a community that might otherwise be short on resources for individuals and families. Each annual conference sets the date to celebrate Rural Life Sunday each year. It is sometimes celebrated in conjunction with a Rogation Service, a service that is asking for God's blessings on the earth and crops, while others include a blessing of the animals on or near this date. As The United Methodist Church, we affirm the important role rural churches have in our history and in the communities they serve.

AUGUST 9: PARK FOREST PRE SCHOOL

A tuition-free preschool for qualifying families that prepares two, three and four-year-old children for kindergarten success. The program promotes cognitive, social emotional, and physical growth in a diverse and nurturing environment. Nutritious breakfasts and lunches are provided daily. September – May: 8:45 a.m. to 12:15 p.m.

AUGUST 17: CENTRE HELPS

Centre Helps navigates the local safety net for our friends and neighbors in need. Whether in crisis or struggling to make ends meet, our community can always find help through the dedicated staff and volunteers at Centre Helps. We connect with our community through our 24/7 hotline, text, chat, and community collaborations. We all have friends who are suffering in silence. Our well-trained, compassionate team helps stabilize the crisis, providing help and hope. The work of Centre Helps serves us all, whether directly or indirectly, by improving the quality of life in our community.

AUGUST 23: MOSHANNON VALLEY BACKPACK PROGRAM

The Backpack Program distributes backpacks full of food each Friday to ensure students have enough food to eat over the weekend. Each child participating will receive breakfast, lunch, dinner, and a snack for both Saturday and Sunday.

AUGUST 30: SUNDAY FELLOWSHIP/DONUTS

God calls us to be in fellowship with one another, not just at worship, but whenever given the chance to share, support, and pray for one another. Our Coffee/Donut Fellowship follows Sunday Worship and offers time to fellowship with one another. Coffee, hot water for tea, juice boxes, and hot chocolate are available for young and old. Donuts or other special treats are also available.

People gather around tables to catch up or just learn more about one another. Monies donated to this mission go to purchase coffee, creamers, juice boxes, cups, napkins, and other supplies. Please join us after worship for this time of sharing with each other.

FOCUS ON MISSION SEPTEMBER

SEPTEMBER 6: INTERFAITH HUMAN SERVICES - GENERAL FUND

Interfaith Human Services reaches out to support residents in Centre County in 4 principal ways: the Center County Fuel Bank which helps people avoid hearing emergencies, the Free Furniture and Appliance Recycling Program which provides furniture and appliances at no cost to the recipients, Basic Needs Financial Assistance which provides emergency funds for things like rent and medical expenses, and the Financial Care Program that helps families manage their bills and budgets.

SEPTEMBER 13: TRUNK OR TREAT

Our fall community gathering will be held on Sunday, October 25, from 4-6 pm. We will have decorated trunks and treats, food, and games held in the FLC. We are in need of folks to decorate trunks and help with food and shepherding children around the FLC, as well as a sensory area. This event is one where we can gather and share God's love with our community, and allows us to be the church in our neighborhood. SEPTEMBER 20: CHRISTIAN EDUCATION SUNDAY

One Sunday each year we celebrate Christian Education Sunday and recognize those who use their gifts to teach and who encourage us to deepen our faith and courageously put that faith into action. Bruce Lee is credited with saying, "Knowing is not enough, we must apply. Willing is not enough, we must do." While he may not have been referring to Christian education, there is an important lesson in these words. In our approach to Christian education in the church, it might be tempting to think knowing the content of the Bible is enough. Yet, as disciples, we know that we must apply scripture to our daily lives. Once we understand how scripture and life intersect, we begin to see that it requires our action. Action on beliefs takes courage. We can find that courage through our participation in Christian education among our communities of faith. When we involve others in our spiritual growth we have the opportunity for support, accountability and the wisdom of sharing life experiences together.

SEPTEMBER 27: SIERRA LEONE INITIATIVE

A partnership begun 12 years ago between the Susquehanna and the Sierra Leone annual conferences — continues to build relationships and open new mission opportunities. The initiative builds and develops direct relationships between the congregations through prayers, letters, phone calls and text messages.

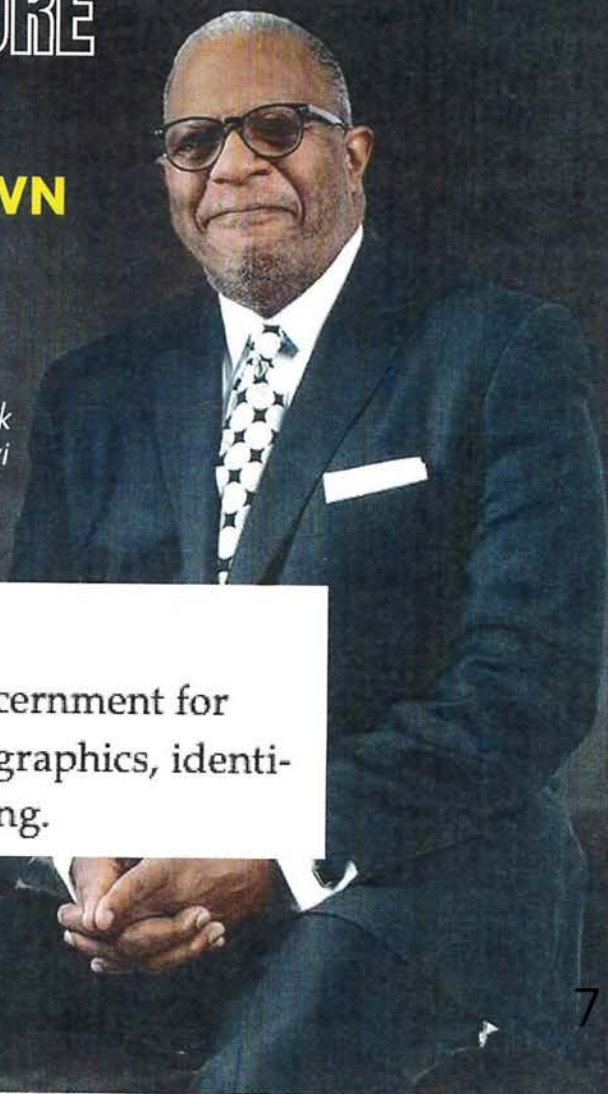

From Bishop Burgos: A Call to Faithful Witness Amid Conflict

Dear siblings in Christ,

In recent months, I have watched with deep concern as some of our congregations have faced significant moments of conflict and disruption during worship and other gatherings. The situations differ, but the pattern is familiar: disagreements that move from faithful conversation into public confrontation.

We have seen worship interrupted by challenges to pastoral leadership—including one moment when a congregant insisted Scripture does not support women in ministry, even as we celebrate seventy years of women's ordination in The United Methodist Church.

We have also seen tensions in faith formation and leadership meetings escalate into repeated disruptions—moments where confrontations and accusations replaced dialogue and grace. These moments are painful, not only for those involved, but for entire congregations who come seeking worship, formation, community, and the presence of Christ.

Worship is sacred space. It is where we experience the living God in community, hear the Word proclaimed, receive the sacraments, and remember who we are as part of the body of Christ. No one should leave worship remembering an argument more vividly than the presence of Jesus Christ. No one should leave a Bible study feeling wounded by the very people they trust with their questions of faith. No one should leave a leadership meeting carrying hurt from words or actions that do not reflect who we are as followers of Christ and United Methodists.

Scripture reminds us that “a gentle answer turns away wrath” (Proverbs 15:1) and calls us to “pursue what makes for peace and mutual upbuilding” (Romans 14:19). And Jesus gave us a clear, grace-filled pathway for navigating conflict in Matthew 18: go first to one another privately, then—if needed—with trusted witnesses, and only, when necessary, involve the wider community through the proper channels. This is not a cookie-cutter formula; it is a posture that protects dignity, honors relationships, and keeps reconciliation at the center.

Health faith communities make room for difficult, honest questions, faithful discernment, and grace-filled accountability—but those conversations must be grounded in humility, respect, and a willingness to treat one another as beloved children of God. We cannot allow our churches to mirror the hostility and division that is taking over our society. The Church must offer a different witness.

Jesus calls us to love boldly, not only when it is easy, but especially when it is hard. Love does not avoid difficult conversations; love transforms how we have them. Love remembers the dignity of the person before us. Love looks for understanding before accusations. Love stays open to the possibility that the Holy Spirit is moving beyond our own certainty.

This letter is not a call to another debate. It is a call to discipleship—to the discipline of prayer, often forgotten or dismissed when conflict takes center stage, yet it is still the very practice that steadies us and reorients us toward Christ. It is a call to reflection. It is a call to live the way of Jesus amid conflict. If we respond to conflict the same way the world does, we reduce our witness to the world's brokenness instead of the hope of God's Reign.

So, before we speak, may we listen. Before we condemn, may we seek understanding. Before we assume we know the Spirit's movement, may we ask where the Spirit is leading—and treat our siblings as we ourselves hope to be treated.

I invite every congregation in the Susquehanna and Upper New York Area to pray for peace, compassion, and reconciliation. Pray for pastors and lay leaders walking through challenging seasons. Clergy are human too, bearing unseen pressures and personal burdens that affect how they lead. Even amid disagreement or the weight of expectations no one can fully meet, they continue looking to serve Christ and the church with faithfulness and integrity.

Pray for those who feel unheard or uncertain. Pray for those carrying anger or fear. Pray that our churches may be places where Christ's love is more visible than the divisions of our society.

To our pastors and lay leaders: thank you. Week after week, you proclaim the Gospel, care for your communities, and lead with courage and grace. And to all of us: let us be ambassadors of reconciliation and peace. In a world where anger is amplified and cruelty is rewarded, the Church is called to offer a different witness.

We do not rise by shouting louder, colluding against those we disagree with, or tearing one another down. We rise by loving boldly—the way of Jesus.

May we be a people who reflect the heart of Christ—joyful in service, courageous in leadership, and always loving boldly.

A Pastoral Prayer

Gracious and loving God, in times of conflict and disruption, draw us back to the heart of Christ. Teach us to listen with humility, speak with grace, and seek understanding before judgment.

Where there is anger, plant compassion. Where there is hurt, bring healing. Where there is division, guide us toward reconciliation and peace.

Strengthen our pastors, lay leaders, staff, and congregations with courage, wisdom, patience, and love. Help us become communities where all are treated with dignity and Christ's presence is made visible through our actions.

In the name of Jesus Christ, our peace, our teacher, and our Lord, we pray. Amen.

FROM THE TRUSTEES

Starting Sunday, August 2, 2026, there will be new safety and security measures beginning. Please know that these changes have been in the works for a while. Discussions around safety and security have been on and off since before COVID shutdowns happened.

Starting this Sunday, the exterior doors will start being locked during worship services. The FLC door will lock at 9:30 and the Main Entrance will lock at 9:45. After 9:45, there will be a person at the Main Entrance to help any late arrivals, persons in need, or other situations that may arise.

- This particular change is in response to a number of issues:

1. There is currently no way to ensure that unauthorized persons cannot access the locations of our children's ministry spaces.
2. Allows for assistance to be offered to persons who are not looking to participate in worship, but have an unexpected need arise (i.e. car breaks down and they "coasted into the parking lot")
3. There have been numerous instances of worship being disrupted by outside individuals who are opposed or upset about the United Methodist Church being "welcome to all"

Please understand, the trustees will continue to monitor safety and security for our children and congregation. They will continue to make changes as necessary and are open to helpful feedback. In keeping with the trustees work in this area, we will be working with emergency service personnel to identify best practices, areas of weak/strong security, and places we can improve safety for all who come to Mt. Nittany for worship, outreach, ministry, assistance, or community programs and education.

Thank you for your patience as we maneuver our way through this process.

Watch for God Bingo

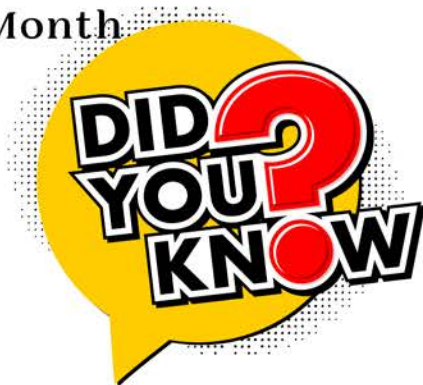
